


### Procurement's impact is huge in the EU

Public buyers buy a wide range of products, services and works








# Goals of procurement policy

Fair competition among operators (equal treatment, nondiscrimination)

Enabling public buyers to make the most efficient use of public funds


Enabling public buyers to support societal and policy goals through PP

### Integration is a game-changer

The EU harmonized public procurement rules since 1970s: this is the basis of a common internal market, as well as to disseminate good practices and cooperate on common issues









### Why sustainable procurement?

- Identify and address environmental & social risks
- Stimulate responsible & sustainable market
- Demonstrate sustainable governance  $\rightarrow$  build trust in institutions and suppliers
- Ensure effective public expenditure  $\rightarrow$  additional benefits for the society
- Policy consistency → buy as you preach; support the administration's sustainability objectives





#### In concrete terms

- Green and social considerations are optional under the law, but encouraged
- Environmental and social legal obligations must be complied (e.g. rules on emissions, recycling, labour rules, health & safety, equality rules)
